# Silicon, silica, silicates and silicone

People get confused about the difference between silicon, silicate, silica and even silicone. What is it exactly that we collect, cut and polish??

**Silicon is a chemical element**, one of the 97 natural building blocks from which our minerals are formed. A chemical element is a substance that can't be subdivided into simple substances without splitting atoms. Silicon is the second most abundant element in the earth's crust, making up about 27% of the average rock. Silicon links up with oxygen (which makes up 55% of the earth's crust) to form the most common suite of minerals, called the silicates. Quartz, feldspars, olivine, micas, thomsonite, jadeite, and prehnite are all silicates. There is so much oxygen around that pure native silicon is almost never found naturally.

**Silica is a bit trickier** concept. It refers the combination of silicon plus oxygen. The mineral quartz is silica. But so are the minerals tridymite, coesite, cristobalite and stishovite which are mineral forms of silica that are stable at high temperatures and pressures. All these minerals are also silicates. In other words, quartz is a silicate made of pure silica. But feldspars contain sodium, aluminum, potassium and calcium in addition to silicon and oxygen. Thus feldspars are silicates but they aren't pure silica.

Geochemists also use the term "silica" to refer to the overall silicon and oxygen content of rocks. This is confusing, but stems from the fact that in rock analysis the sample is dissolved, the solution treated, and the amount of silicon present is determined by precipitating it as silica. So a geologist may say "This rock is 48% silica". A rockhound will look at the rock and say "How can that be? I don't see any quartz in it!" Both are right. The rock will not have the mineral quartz because the silicon and oxygen are tied up with other elements to make silicate minerals like feldspar. Its a bit like looking at a cake and saying "I don't see any eggs in there!" The eggs are cake ingredients, but are present in different forms.

**Now, what is silicone?** It's a synthetic polymer of silicon with carbon and oxygen that could be in solid, liquid or gel form. It has all kinds of medical uses, such as in antacids, artificial joints, pacemakers and implants of various notoriety, but is not, as far as anyone knows, found in rocks.

Can pure silicon be found in Nature? Yes, rarely. Recently Russian geologists were sampling gases from Kudriavy volcano on the Kamchatka Peninsula. Here they drove quartz tubes into vents jetting out gases of over 900 degrees C. Their tubes filled with minerals precipitating from this gas. Among them were pure silicon metal embedded in masses of salts such as halite. The silicon formed crystals up to 0.3 mm across. It was associated with pure aluminum metal, Si-Al alloys and other rare minerals. This find was unusual enough to warrant a note in the prestigious science journal, *Nature*.

So unless you are in Russia sampling hot volcanic gases, you can be sure that what you are finding are silica and silicates, but not silicon or silicone.

# Life and minerals evolve together

## Earth's Special Recipe

Nov. 13, 2008 -- Etched in the shockwaves of exploding stars, in the gas and dust of fledgling stellar nebulae -- and in Earth's ample oceans, winds and fiery volcanoes -- the multi-billion-year history of minerals appears ageless to us mere mortals.

But an ambitious new study describes how these seemingly static forms have evolved through the ages, just like biological life. From the 12 "primordial" minerals forged inside supernovae to the 4,300 or so mineral species known today, minerals have diversified, grown in complexity, and even been driven into extinction.

"The most basic definition of evolution is change over time," said Robert Hazen of the Carnegie Institution in Washington, D.C., who led a team of researchers in the work, published today in the journal *American Mineralogist*. "And that's dramatically displayed in the stories of minerals."

Before life evolved on Earth, the slow inexorable grind of plate tectonics created a total of 1,500 mineral species. Now, Hazen said, most minerals require living creatures to spring into existence.

"That's about as far as we think you can get without life," he said. That means about two-thirds of all known minerals depend on Earth's living creatures to survive.

In life's beginnings, it may have been the other way around.

"Many people believe that life first appeared from some sort of interaction of organic molecules on a mineral surface," said Peter Heaney of Pennsylvania State University.

If all life were suddenly wiped out, the 20-percent-oxygen atmosphere we currently enjoy would vanish in a matter of years. Along with the O<sub>2</sub>, all those minerals would go extinct.

Minerals containing radioactive elements with short half-lives, such as plutonium, melted into extinction long ago (all plutonium on Earth today is man-made). And Heaney suspects there's a new field of mineral archaeology just waiting to be born.

"No one has ever mapped out mineral extinction in Earth's history," Heaney said. "In a way, [Hazen's] work forces us to think in those terms and look for the mineral equivalent of a fossil record."

## Key Event That Breaks Continents Apart Discovered

Dec. 11, 2008 — Researchers have captured for the first time a geological event considered key in shaping the Earth's landscape. An international research team was able to measure ground displacements as two tectonic plates in Africa moved apart and molten rock pushed its way toward the surface during the first so-called "dyking event" ever recorded within the planet's continental crust. The event left a wall of magma 6 miles long and 5 feet wide wedged between the two plates. A paper detailing the event was published Dec. 11 in *Nature*.

Dyking events have been reported in the thin oceanic crust but had never been directly observed and quantified in the thicker areas of the planet's shell, researcher Eric Calais, professor of geophysics at Purdue University said.

## Hints to make life easier

**Editor's Note:** I haven't tried these ideas unless otherwise noted. Caution and common sense are advised when trying any new product or procedure. You're on your own!

**Slow down that tarnish!** Tarnish is caused by sulfur gases in the air. Chalk naturally absorbs sulfur. Place sticks of ordinary chalk in your cases, and jewelry boxes. Put it in your tool chest, too, since it also absorbs moisture. I have chalk in a few places along with Pacific Silver Cloth and Ziploc bags.

**To make labels that glow** in the dark for fluorescent rocks, mix quinine and water to use for ink. It glows a bright bluish-white under black light.

**White vinegar** can get that epoxy off your cab. Just soak the cab in a little bowl of vinegar. It takes anywhere from a few minutes to overnight. I've tried this and it works.

**Discourage those snails!** Don't throw away those worn out sandpaper discs. Instead, cut a slit up the radius, and lay them down like a collar around the stems of your plants. Slugs won't cross the scratchy surface! I'm going to try this one!
