Study Group Leaders

It was suggested at our last board meeting by the board of directors that I include the following passage from our operating regulations. Please review the following operating regulations for your groups. Please make sure you are following the guidelines listed below.

12. Intra-Society Groups/Organizations

It is the policy of this Society to encourage members to form groups to further their specialties in keeping with the Objectives of our Society. To obtain recognition as an authorized activity of this Society, any so formed group must meet, and conform to the following requirements:

12.1 All members of the respective study groups must be members in good standing of this Society. It is a requirement that not less than two officers be recognized within the Group: a Chair and a Secretary-Treasurer (or other suitable title). Guests are welcome to attend the meetings.

12.2 The group shall select a suitable title/name for their organization.

12.3 The group may petition in writing to the Society's President for official recognition. The petition shall include all officers' names, proposed meeting intervals, meeting location, types of activities to be pursued, and any other information that would assist the Board of Directors in evaluating the merits of the petition.

12.4 The Society's President will present, under New Business, the petition at the very next regularly scheduled Board of Directors' meeting. The Board of Directors may take up to three full months to evaluate the petition and to prepare their reply. The Board of Directors will notify the Group of their decision in writing.

12.5 All normal and operating expenses incurred by the group will be paid for by the group. Special funding and monies may be petitioned for the group to the Board of Directors.

12.6 Advance approval of the Board of Directors must be obtained before the group may make any commitment in the name of the Society. This covers all phases of activities, practices, projects, whether or not financial outlay is involved. Nothing is excluded from this requirement.

12.7 Minutes of the group activities and meetings will be given to the Editor for publication in the Breccia to keep the Society members and the Board informed of the group activities. These minutes may be edited for space availability.

12.8 Any and all public contact made by the group will be done in the name of the group and this Society, and will conform to our Code of Ethics.

HOW IS YOUR COLLECTION DOING?

First off, I should ask: You do have a collection, don't you? Don't you?

The reason I ask is that I am a firm believer that each our club members collect something. These collections could be one from any number of items.

Let's see; possibly, rocks you have found on field trips (that could include minerals, fossils and even oddities from any earth science branch that might catch your eye), slabs of material for your lapidary project, faceting material you wish to facet some day or have already completed, carvings made of rock, bowls or eggs And, you can see that the list can go on and on.

So what is your favorite? I am sure that your collection sits in a prominent place in your favorite room in your home. In fact, I am sure you have invested a good bit of time and/or money into your pride and joy.

You are undoubtedly wondering where I am going with this. Well, why don't you share your interest with our club members and the general public by entering a case showing your cherished collection into our next show?

Now, I know that some of you may think that April is too far away, but by considering doing this at this time, you will gain ample time to work out any difficulties you may encounter between the present and the time of the show.

The key is to decide to do this as early as possible and start your planning now. You will have ample time to make a set of liners to best show your collection, decide upon the placement of the items in your case, make labels (if needed); in fact, you can obtain a case from our club to set up in your home, test your liners and make a trial run of your display. By trying it all out now will allow you to make any adjustments to your layout while in the comfort of your home.

It almost sounds too easy, doesn't it? If you make this decision early, it will make it much smoother for you as the date comes nearer and will prevent much of the pressure one feels at the last hours before the show.

Making the choice to enter a case of your collection and/or favorite items will assist the club in producing a superb show for the coming year and will publicize your collection for all to see and may entice someone visiting our show for the first time to wish to learn more about our club and activities.

Please give it some thought today and make that decision and may I be the first welcome you to the group of members who proudly show their collections in our shows.

The Agates of Northern Mexico

Did you happen to attend rock shows in the 50's and 60's and fall in love with the beautiful banded agates of Laguna and Coyamita? Did you dream of the day when you could take a trip to Mexico and hunt the agates yourself? According to author Brad Cross, your best chance is to watch for estate sales from Texas rockhounds.

The credit for discovering Mexican agates and Laguna, in particular, goes to Dr. Ralph Mueller and a reference published in Lapidary Journal in the late 1940's. Most of the agates are named for the large ranches (Spanish land grants of over 35 million acres to seven families between 1884 and 1922) in the Mexican state of Chihuahua. The state of Chihuahua includes migrating sand dunes, the Mexican portion of the Sonoran Desert (grassy plains) and igneous mountains overlaying limestone deposits. Mining and cattle ranching are the two primary businesses. Each agate site produced distinctive banding, different from the others. Manganese compounds produced shades of violet and iron contributes reds and yellows.

When you first begin researching, it sounds like the supply of beautiful agates is never ending. They are produced in the gas pockets of volcanic flows that may be as thick as 500 feet and contain as many as 20 different flows. More reading reveals that the agates occur in only the top layers, and not in all of them. Finally you learn that in the 40's and 50's when rockhounds first began collecting, the agates lay loose on the ground, product of countless years of weathering. Once the ground surface had been cleared, local people began hand digging in the hard andesite matrix to free the agates. Most of the favorite and best known sites have been exhausted to the point only small and not particularly colorful agates are produced, if any. Geodes and crazy lace agate is still fairly plentiful.

The local people in Chihuahua are well aware of the value of the agates produced there, so don't kid yourself into thinking you can take a trip and get good agates cheaply! The mines are hand dug with picks and shovels and rarely with bulldozers. Top grade agates are rare so miners like to sell "mine run." Since they deal commercially with wholesalers, (Mr. Cross says) they will probably not even show their best finds to the vacationing visitor.

Time and Talent Sharing

Each year we have elections. To do that, we have three people from the Board and general membership put together a slate of proposed officers. To get this slate, the nominating committee must ask other members to run for offices.



Safety First

Hammers used by rock hounds come in every size, type and construction, and include rock hammers, bricklayer's or mason's hammers, blacksmith's or sledgehammers, machinist's peen hammers, jeweler's hammers, setting hammers, soft face hammers, lead or copper faced hammers, trimmer's and welder's hammers, as well as a variety of mallets, such as rawhide, rubber, and tinner's. I have even seen napping hammers (a 3 pound high carbon steel hammer with tapering faces used for forming stones during road construction or similar stone work) and railroad track mauls (used for driving railroad spikes). As it is hard to anticipate what a rockhounds "favorite weapon" will be, I though I would present a list of general hammer safety practices followed by the proper use of some of the more common hammer types.



Always select the proper type, size, and weight of hammer for the job.



Always wear eye protection.



Always strike a hammer blow squarely, avoiding glancing blows and over and under strikes. The hammers striking face should be parallel with the surface being struck.



When striking a chisel, punch, or wedge, the striking face of the hammer should be 3/8" larger than the struck face of the tool. Both the striking hammers face and the struck face of the tool should be free of oil.



Do not strike another hammer with a hammer.



Do not strike a harder surface with a hard surface hammer.

Never use a hammer with dents, cracks, chips, mushrooming, or excessive wear. Replace the hammer; redressing is not recommended. Replace worn or damaged handles. A qualified individual should replace hammer handles. Most hardware stores will replace hammer handles for a nominal fee. They can also provide a rubber sleeve for sledge hammers, which will prevent handle damage just above the head.

Bricklayer's or mason's hammers are designed for setting or splitting bricks, masonry tile, and concrete blocks. Never use them to strike metal or drive tools such as chisels. The blade of a bricklayer's hammer should be kept sharp by redressing at a 40 degree angle with a bench grinder. Keep the metal cool while grinding by quenching often in water to protect the metal's tempering.

Hand drilling hammers are used with chisels, star drills, punches, and hardened nails. Never use common nail (claw) hammers for striking metal, such as chisels, as they are designed for driving unhardened nails and their shape, depth of face, and balance make them unsuitable for this use.. Machinist's peen hammers (ball, cross, or straight) are designed for striking chisels and punches and riveting, straightening and shaping metal. Blacksmith's or sledge hammers are designed for striking wood, metal, concrete, or stone, depending on size, weight, and shape.

When using a hammer, grip the handle near the end where it is designed for gripping and will give you the best control and impact with the least effort. Watch your hands, shins, and feet. It may be advisable to wear gloves, long sleeve shirts, and high lacing safety shoes to protect from flying debris and sharp shards if the situation warrants it. When storing hammers for a period of time, lightly lubricate metal parts, but wipe any oil or grease from rubber mallets or rubber handle grips to prevent damage to the rubber. So get out there and hammer up a storm, safely.

Agate to Dye For

One of the nicest colors in the world of agates is rich reddish brown. This color is often called carnelian, sard, or even carbuncle, if you recognize it as one of the stones on Aaron's breastplate. This color is found naturally in many different places in the world. In many cases, however, the original color may be been something else. Agate dyeing has been commonplace in Idar-Oberstein for hundreds of years. For this quick discussion, I'll present some of the basics for making your own carnelian, and you are free to experiment. Some agates can be colored to carnelian simply by heating to convert the iron already in the agate to iron oxide. Many Brazilian stream agates and some Montana/Wyoming agates will respond to this treatment. It's best to rough grind the agate close to its final shape, because color penetration may be limited, and you want your stone to be uniform in color.

It's important to understand that there may be wide variations in the porosity and water content of quartz from different locales, so don't expect an exact recipe for the piece you have in your hand. In fact, you are likely to find wide variations within a single piece that affect how the color is absorbed. This selective absorption may enhance the patterns in various layered or fortification agates.

Once you understand the basics, you are free to experiment. The basics are:

Cut the material as close to the desired size and shape as you can. Use the coarsest grinding wheel you have, such as 100 or 120 grit.

Get as much water out of the agate as you can.

Get some iron oxide into the agate, or just heat it to convert what is already there.

Heat it carefully.

Cool it slowly and evenly.

1. Start with a piece that is moderately clear or translucent. Don't attempt to color the darker Indian agate or the Brazilian muddy browns; it won't work. Grind to rough shape on a coarse 100 or 120 grit wheel. Boil it in water with a slight amount of detergent, and then boil it in clean water. Three or four minutes for each step is plenty/
2. Next, you want to get the stone as dry as possible. This will make room for the dye to penetrate, and remove water that might turn to steam when the stone is heated. A quick way is to heat the stone in a sand bath at 100 degrees F for at least an hour, and then increase the temperature to about 200 degrees F for a couple of more hours. Don't let it reach the boiling point of water, which is 212 degrees F. What is a sand bath, you say? A sand bath is simply a metal container with a couple of cups of fine sand in it. Place the stone somewhere near the middle of the sand. Preheat the bath for at least an hour to get it to a uniform temperature.
3. You may skip this step if you suspect there is enough iron in your agate. Otherwise, soak the stone in a hot solution of iron oxide in water for 3-4 hours, just below a boil. Add a pinch of detergent to lower the surface tension of the solution. Iron oxide is simply rust. You can make your own or buy it from a chemical supply house.
4. Preheat the sand bath to about 100 degrees F and place the stone in it for at least an hour. Then increase the temperature to about 200 degrees F for a couple more hours. Raise the temperature to around 350 degrees F for at least an hour. Raise the temperature to 450-500 degrees F and leave everything closed for at least 3 hours.
5. Turn the oven off and let it cool down to room temperature. The more iron you get in, the richer the color will be.

AGATE-Master of Pattern

Agate is the most important variety of chalcedony which, in turn, is the most common variety of quartz. Agate and chalcedony belong to the cryptocrystalline family of quartz. Cryptocrystalline comes from the Greek word *kryptos* meaning "hidden" or "secret". In other words, agate is made up of an aggregation of microscopic fine crystals that cannot be distinguished individually by the human eye. The advantage of the cryptocrystalline property is that it makes the material very tough, and does not have a cleavage plane. Because of these properties, its hardness of 6.5, its many colors and patterns, and common occurrence, agate is an excellent material for lapidary work.

Varieties of agate are endless; it is banded, spotty, patchy, or may have inclusions that resemble trees, ferns, or seaweed. Many names have been given to the varieties of agate. Some of the more common and standard are:

Banded - concentric, narrow bands of contrasting color.

Fortification - Bands which make angular turns, somewhat like the outline of an old style fortress.

Eye - banded agate cut at a low angle across a hump-like projection, thus creating circular bands of contrasting hue; often improved by judicious dyeing.

Iris - Any agate or chalcedony in which polished thin sections held to a strong light shows a brilliant display of rainbow colors.

Ruin - Broken bits of banded agate cemented together with more agate; rare.

Moss Agate - Clear agate with moss-like inclusion; with the property shaped mossy markings, other names may be given such as tree, fern, etc.

Sagenite - Containing fine needles of other minerals or cavities left by them.

Plume - Moss type in which inclusions look like billowing ostrich feathers.

Flowers - moss agate in which varicolored inclusions resemble a group of blossoms.

The occurrence of agate is firmly common throughout the world because it is derived from silica (SiO_2) which is the prime ingredient of the earth's surface.

However, agate occurs only rarely as veins or seams filling the fissures of rocks. The more common occurrence of agate is in the vesicles of certain volcanic rocks such as porphyries and basalts and especially in amygdaloidal melaphyres. Most of the agates used for cutting come from these almost-shaped cavities.

Some believe that agate was deposited in the cavities by silica-enriched water which flooded and drained from the cavities time after time, each time leaving a thin layer or coating of agate. Others maintain that agates were formed from the silica gel that crystallized out as radial-fibered quartz masses of roughly almond-shaped form. The crystallization of the silica was governed by the varying rate of cooling, which proceeded by irregular phases. Faster or slower crystallization resulted in fine gray bands or coarse white bands.
