Show news What a wonderful show!

Here's some comments from our show staff and others:

I think the Treasure Hunt was a great idea. All the kids and parents seemed to love it. It was fun to see how anxious the kids were to find the right answers and their excitement to get a treasure!

Since I missed being able to work in the scholarship booth this year, I liked having the treasure chest in the hospitality booth. I know it took some time and effort to put together, so I hope it served the purpose and brought exposure to the different areas and especially the vendors.

One thing to keep in mind if doing it again - it does need to be staffed continuously with a person dedicated just to that. I think Frank estimated that about 1000 kids participated and received buttons.

Carol Pimentel (Hospitality)

We had 2050 paid admissions, around 2000 kids and between 500 to 700 free admissions.

There were about 100 display cases of which 25 were competitive.

There were 88 people who attended the banquet and 44 attended the breakfast.

All the dealers seemed to be happy. Financials will follow. The show overall was a resounding success.

Frank Mullaney (Show chair)

"Are those real pearls?" We heard this more than any other question.

Neither the children nor many of the adults had ever seen someone knot between pearls.

Pat Speece (Pearl knotting demonstrator)

How much are those pearls? *How do you make those pearls? Why are you tying knots on the string of pearls? How are pearls made?* We heard these comments over and over.

Both children and adults were interested in the pearls and the setting of various stones.

I enjoy passing on information and methods of stone setting and pearl stringing. The little kids all wanted to know how the pearls got into oysters.

Kelly Van Vleck (Pearl knotting and stone setting demonstrator)

Comments about the show were all positive: "This is better

than I thought it would be. Really great for kids. The dinosaur guy is awesome! Wow, this is so big." Obsidian was very popular. The double wheel was a hit. Nancy Reineking and Michael Paone (Scholarship Booth)

Frequent questions for Larry Knutson: Larry always brings a large faceted glass stone, purple in color. 9 out of 10 kids thought it was a real diamond.

For chain making by Mary Lu: Is that gold? Can you make me a chain? How long does it take? That long? Can I do that here?

Quite a few people were interested considering all the other demonstrations going on. Many times the kids would watch the faceting, and the mothers would watch the chain making.

I choose chain making because there is not a lot of material to haul around and it is easy to clean up and also easy to demonstrate.

What I feel was interesting about my demo at the Cutters/Grinders station was being able to show the visitors how a "rock" found on a walk could go from what looked like an ordinary rock to something beautiful in a cabochon form (the "before" and "after" and the stages in between).

I was pleasantly surprised when I asked children if they collected rocks at home; many said "yes". A number of them proudly held up their bag of rocks received at the Kids Area minutes earlier.

Hobby Hints

You're on your own!

1- Is it a Cz, or diamond? If the stone is loose, turn it iupside down on its table and slide it over a thin black line on a piece of paper. When looking straight down through a CZ, you wil see a circle in the center of the stone. A diamond won't do this.

2- To clean nonplastic metal costume jewelry, immerse it in rubbing alcohol for five minutes. Rinse in warm water and dry with a lintfree cloth. To prevent metal costume jewelry from tarnishing, store it with a piece of white chalk.

More Hobby Hints

The Breccia has not tried these hints unless otherwise noted, and advises caution when trying any new procedure or products. Comments or questions welcomed.

1- Make your own sanding sticks using paint stirring sticks from the paint store, or yardsticks cut to size. Glue the emery paper onto one side, label the grit on the other side, and you are ready as soon as the glue dries. This works with popsicle sticks, too. [This works.]

2-Use stainless steel cotter pins to hold pieces in place while sweat soldering. [This works.]

The Paleontological Resources Preservation Act Is Now Public Law

To The Members of the Society of Vertebrate Paleontology:

On March 25, 2009 the House of Representatives passed a Public Lands Bill that contained the Paleontological Resources Preservation Act (PRPA) by a a vote of 285 – 140. The bill has been signed by the president and is now public law.

Although the information has always been readily available on the SVP website, we offer this reminder of what the PRPA actually does:

The Paleontological Resources Preservation Act codifies the exhausting practice of requiring that vertebrate fossils and other rare and scientifically significant fossils be collected only by qualified researchers who obtain a permit. Permittees must agree to deposit the fossils in public institutions, which will ensure their future availability to researchers and the public. The PRPA strengthen penalties and acts as deterrent for illegal collecting activity.

The PRPA greatly benefits amateur paleontologist. For instance, the BLM and Forest Service have been allowing casual collecting of common plant and invertebrate fossils for many years, but without specific statuary authority from Congress. This activity could have been taken away at any time. However, the PRPA ensures amateurs can continue to pursue their hobby on BLM and Forest Service Lands. The Savings Provision specifies that, **"nothing contained in the Act shall apply to, or require a permit for, casual collecting of a rock, mineral or invertebrate or plant fossil that is not protected under this Act."**

Over the years there has been an abundance of misinformation regarding the PRPA. Please note that the PRPA DOES NOT:

- 1. Affect Private lands or Indian Lands in any way.
- 2. Prosecute anyone for misidentifying a fossil unless that misidentification is made in association with a knowing criminal violation of the PRPA.
- 3. Interfere with rock collecting.
- 4. Restrict access to those who do not have a Ph.D.
- 5. Interfere with mining on federal land.
- 6. Create restrictions for public lands access.

In the days ahead, SVP's Government Affairs Committee will offer any expertise that is required by federal agencies in regard to regulations and implementation of the PRPA. We will also take a look at new initiatives and opportunities that will greatly benefit the SVP and the science of vertebrate paleontology.

This has been a very long and arduous process that has been under consideration for almost 18 years. It is hard to imagine how many members of the Society, Congressional staffers, associated societies and friends have contributed to the success and passage of the PRPA. We want to thank everyone who helped in a small and large way, because without your determination and support, passage of the PRPA would not have been possible.
