April 2024 Breccia Prez Message


Hello SCVGMS Members and Friends!




Our March General Meeting was held on the 26th. Dr. Phil Kesten gave us a presentation on "The Colors of Rocks". You might recognize that Dr. Kesten has been providing chapters from his upcoming book in recent issues of Breccia. To note, and a call for volunteers: I have three presentation slots to fill in August, September, and October meetings. I'd like to encourage you to present to us during one of these meetings. It can be very informal and you don't absolutely need to create a slide deck, so this can be an easy way to share your particular passions in the world of geology,



gy, or lapidary.

A small hardystonite (blue), calcite (red), and willemite (green) with franklinite (non-fluorescent) under shortwave UV light. This is a classic from the Franklin Mine, in Franklin, New Jersey. Long considered the fluorescent mineral capital of the world, more than 360 different mineral species have been found there - a world record for such a small area. About 90 of these minerals are fluorescent and more than two dozen of these have been found nowhere else on Earth. I acquired this specimen at our Annual Show.

We now have three initiatives underway with the Board of Directors. The Capital Planning Committee is on standby while the By-Laws Review Committee completes its work. The By-Laws have not been updated in a very long time, so we have a chance to simplify them in many places to ensure that we are able to easily comply with our own rules. We will also need to add new and correct legal language so we are fully in compliance with state laws that have changed over the years. The proposed new By -laws will be voted on by club members at an upcoming General Meeting, and notice and information will be provided in the emails that I send in advance of such meetings. Lastly, we have formed an Audit Committee to review our financial records and practices, and this is an annual requirement. I do not yet have any information to share, but I can tell you that the committee will produce a final report that



will be sent to all club members.

Greenland is a top contender for second-best place in the world for glow rocks. Here we have a tugtupite (cherry red) and chkalovite (green) from Kvanefjeld, Ilimaussaq Complex and a "fantasy rock" with tugtupite eyes (red), analcime (blue/white), and chkalovite (green) from the Taseq Slope near Narsaq. Both specimens are under shortwave UV light. I acquired both specimens at the Annual Show.



This is a platy margarosanite (bluish white) with a bit of calcite (red) from the Jacobsberg Mine in Nordmark, Sweden. This mineral is a rare lead silicate, and the lead analogue of walstromite. Specimens from Franklin, NJ are highly-prized and expensive, but pieces from Sweden are far more reasonably priced and often provide more coverage. This piece was also acquired at our Annual Show!





"BLM's regulations (43 CFR 8365.1-5(b)(2)) *generally* allow members of the public to collect reasonable amounts of nonrenewable resources such as rocks, mineral specimens, and semiprecious gemstones for noncommercial purposes on BLM-managed public lands. Noncommercial means that the collector is not selling the items for a business or financial gain. Such collection is generally not allowed, however, in certain areas, such as on developed recreation sites, where there are active mining claims or other authorized mineral uses, or on lands where the mineral estate is owned privately."

Rockhounding on Public Lands

On February 29, 2024 an email was sent out from the BLM District in El Centro, CA. with a new Website for Recreational Rockhounding on Public Lands. The website includes definitions, FAQ, A Guide to Collecting on Public Lands and Collecting areas in many states.

Take a look at the New BLM Website "Rockhounding on Public Lands" that has just been posted.

The website contains very good information and the Rockhounding Community needs to engage in a way to take action as to increase the awareness of Recreational Rockhounding on Public Lands!

When you visit the website: <u>https://www.blm.gov/programs/recreation/rockhounding</u>, check out the Rockhounding on Public Lands on the right side of the page.

Look at all the states listed there and see if Rockhounding as a recreational activity is listed. If it is, then things are close to being all right.

If it is not listed, you need to contact the BLM in your area (State) and ask that it be included. Work with the Land Managers to help insure that the Recreational Rockhound does not go the way of the Passenger Pigeon. As many Recreational Rockhounds as possible need to do this and make their voices heard by the Land Managers. Recreational Rockhounding needs to be listed as a recognized Recreational Activity in as much detail as reasonable.

This needs to be done on an individual, Club/Society, Regional Federation and National (AFMS) levels.

Make the voice of the Recreational Rockhound be heard!

Fortification


This is a banded agate with parallel layers that more or less follow the shape of the nodule or vein. The banding often makes sharp angular turns that resemble the parapets of old fortresses which is how the term fortification originated. The bands are actually composed of micro dots of color vs. a solid banding of color. The dots are not normally seen with the naked eye but can be seen with a high magnification microscope.



Agates sometimes appear to have sections of moss or bush-like inclusions. For many years it was thought that the "moss" was actually organic plant matter but eventually it was determined that there was no carbon in the rock and the "bushes" were composed of mineral impurities, typically iron or manganese oxides.



Gypsum

Nearly 30 million years ago, hot magma driven upward from deep inside the Earth forced hot water to bubble up into the caverns, gaps, and even the tiny pockets within the limestone that undergirds so much of the surface of the Earth. This water was rich in minerals, and a significant fraction of those minerals was in the form of calcium sulfate. The molecules in calcium sulfate are made up of a calcium (Ca) atom, a sulfur (S) atom, and four oxygen (O) atoms bonded together, that is, CaSO₄. As the hot water cooled, and as it drained away over time, a variety of secondary minerals formed from the minerals it left behind, most notably the crystal composed of a calcium sulfate molecule bonded to two water molecules. A water molecule is two hydrogen (H) atoms bonded to an oxygen (O) atom, or H_2O . And a calcium sulfate molecule connected to two water molecules? That is $CaSO_4 \cdot 2H_2O...$ the mineral known as gypsum. The most common crystalline form of gypsum is selenite, which is often found as clusters of long, prismatic, transparent or translucent blades (Fig. 1a.), or as roundish balls of flat blades, known as "desert rose" (Fig. 1b.).



Gypsum is soft, at a hardness of 2 on the Mohs hardness scale. (The Girls Can Flirt And Other Queer Things Can Do: talc, gypsum, calcite, fluorite, apatite, orthoclase feldspar, quartz, topaz, corundum, and diamond in order of hardness from 1 to 10. So said the German geologist Friedrich Mohs.) Nearly anything else you can find, a piece of fluorite or quartz, say, will scratch gypsum. And, oh my, even your fingernail, at a Mohs hardness of 2.5, will leave a scratch on a specimen of gypsum.

The relative softness of gypsum is a result of the way that the calcium sulfate molecules are connected to the water molecules in $CaSO_4 \cdot 2H_2O$. The structure of gypsum consists of double layers of water molecules interspersed between layers of calcium sulfate molecules. The bonds between the hydrogen atoms in the water are relatively weak, so the bonds that hold together the layers of molecules in gypsum are also relatively weak. Relatively weak bonds that are easily broken... which allows flakes of calcium sulfate to become separated from the surface of a chunk of gypsum. As a result, gypsum is soft and easily scratched.

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You might have a specimen of gypsum in your collection. But even if you do not, the chances are good that you already have some gypsum close at hand. For starters, alabaster – a form of gypsum – is a popular material from which flooring tiles are made. And while some geologists distinguish between them, there is at least some overlap between alabaster and travertine, another popular flooring material. So you might likely be walking around on gypsum in your house! Although truth to tell, with a Mohs hardness of 1.5 to 2, alabaster tiles are not particularly resistant to scratching, and travertine is not much harder. They both look nice, though!

Gypsum is also used in the manufacture of drywall boards ("sheetrock"). Most home construction today (and for many years) has used drywall boards as wall boards. These boards are often made by applying a layer of plaster, in liquid form, to a sheet of paper. The plaster slurry hardens at it dries, and becomes the main component of the boards that are used to make walls in most new construction. And that plaster slurry? Plaster is a mixture of water and powdered gypsum. And as a fan of etymology, I find this is cool: we get the word "gypsum" from the Greek γ úψoς («gypsos"), meaning plaster.

Is there any cement in your immediate environment? Probably so... cement is used to hold bricks together in the construction of the foundations of houses and other buildings, and also of sidewalks and walkways. And there is certainly gypsum in that cement: without gypsum added as a "retarding agent" to wet cement, the cement would dry too quickly, causing it to be too weak to withstand the stresses generated when more material is added upon it. As the agent that regulates the setting time of wet cement, gypsum it is truly indispensable in construction.

(To be 100% on the up-and-up, over the last few years the cost to mine and process gypsum has risen. So in more and more construction applications, artificial gypsum is now substituted for natural gypsum – gypsum that comes out of the ground.)

Gypsum has many industrial applications. Surely, though, you would not want to put any gypsum in your mouth! Rocks in your mouth – not appetizing. But surprise! You likely put some gypsum in your mouth every day. And you might even eat some gypsum every day!

Because of the way that it holds itself together, and also the way it holds other materials together, gypsum – in powdered form – makes an excellent additive with which to stabilize food products. And when firmness is a desired attribute of a food product, gypsum powder also makes food products firmer. No need to worry about gypsum in your food, though: gypsum is recognized by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration as safe for humans to ingest.

Calcium sulfate, derived from gypsum powder, finds its way into many foods and beverages. It can be found, for example, as an additive in most cheeses, in various nut butters, and in custards. Small quantities of powdered gypsum are often added to water in the process of making beer. to increase the hardness of the water and also to make it less acidic. In scientific terms, "less acidic", means a

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higher "pH" of the water; this higher pH tends to enhance the perception of hop flavors in the finished product. And "hoppiness" is favored by many beer connoisseurs! Small quantities of powdered gypsum are also often used in the production of red wine – the sulfur in the calcium sulfate kills bacteria that could otherwise ruin the wine.

As an added bonus, gypsum enriches the calcium content of foods... calcium is one of the most important minerals required to promote good health in humans. Calcium helps build and maintain strong bones, for example, and our muscles and nerves need calcium to function properly. In addition, recent studies have suggested that calcium can protect us against cancer, diabetes, and high blood pressure. Okay, do not try to take a bite out of that specimen of selenite in your collection. But yes, know that in powdered form, gypsum has been added to make other things you eat and drink.

And wait, one more important use of (powdered) gypsum: there is likely some in your toothpaste. Nearly all toothpaste sold today contains fluoride, known to prevent and even reverse tooth decay. But for the same reason that our bodies need calcium to build strong bones, putting calcium (yes, ground up gypsum!) in toothpaste helps harden the enamel that forms the outer covering of our teeth, and in general helps promote strong teeth.

Gypsum. It has many applications in construction. It finds its way into the foods we eat and the beverages we consume. And best of all... pieces of gypsum, in its various forms, make a great addition to any rock and mineral collection!
